Knowing more about reading and phonics in school

There is a host of information on the website to help parents understand how we teach reading. If you go to 'Curriculum', 'Subjects', 'Literacy', you will find guidance on phonics and links for families to support at home. Please continue to look out for the Phonics events in school.

With half term on the horizon, a visit to the village library and also a browse on the class bookshelf, is sure to ensure children have access to reading material over the break.

Sharing pupil progress

Over the year, we host a number of events to share pupil progress with families. We have two Parents Evenings—one in the Autumn term (face to face) and one in the Spring Term (Virtual). We also have two opportunities for families to view children's work—in the Autumn term, it is the Festive Open Evening and in the Spring Term, Open Classrooms. In the Summer Term, we welcome families into school to see other aspects of pupils' education—music, dance and poetry at POPFEST and also P.E during Sports Day.

At the end of the year, families receive an annual report—providing information on their child's attitude to learning and also their effort and attainment in subjects. Included in this document is a child's progress through the school reward system—C.L.I.M.B certificates and 5 Ways to Well being as well as our school values, The 9Rs.

Each term, families will be provided with a traffic light colour linked to attendance and punctuality. This raises awareness of current attendance patterns, that families may not be aware of. If the school has concerns, families will be contacted by Mrs Mitchinson to discuss this further. See page 3 for Traffic lights.

Staffing

Having been a teacher at POPS for over 7 Years, Mr Buckett has decided to move on to pastures new. He is currently teaching Tamar Class in Year 4 and will leave at the end of the Autumn Term. Interviews will be held after half term and the successful candidate will be introduced to the children. We will then make arrangements to ensure a smooth transition for the New Year.

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Personal Development

At POPS, Personal Development is enhanced by our Young Leaders Programme. In September, children in KS2 were invited to apply for a role as either an Eco Leader, a Charity leader, a Playground Ranger, a Build-it Leader, a member of the Corridor Crew or a Digital Leader. I am absolutely delighted to tell you that we have 104 Young Leaders (and rising) in school! Children will be trained and will have a timetabled slot to carry out their role. After half term, our Charity Leaders will introduce their first event, which is the Poppy Appeal. They have already distributed posters to classrooms and will introduce the two week window for Poppy donations when we return.



Positive parenting

In the Endurio Parent Survey, families said they would appreciate some guidance on parenting. There is no secret book to perfect parenting and that's because all children are different, as are their families and circumstances. Parenting styles have changed considerably since we were children and families today have different understandings of what is deemed as acceptable behaviours or what qualifies as a reasonable request from children. Added to this, children are smart—very early on they learn to 'play parents off each other' or even worse, compare you to a friend's parents—eek! Parenting skills develop as your child does and what works when they are 5, no longer does when they are 7 years old.

The NSPCC has produced a brief guidance paper called 'Positive Parenting', that some may find helpful. The important thing for us to remember is that children are constantly learning about themselves and their emotions and so like us, they don't always get it right—but it's a process. We lay down rules and boundaries because they are prevalent in our society and so from an early age, children need to understand right from wrong, that they can't always have what they want and that there are often consequences if they fail to follow instructions. The best solution is to talk—to the child, to friends, family and school. When you feel like you are hitting a brick wall or failing as a parent because 'the Jones family' don't have this problem, take a breath and remember that you are not alone and 'the Jones Family' maybe isn't all that perfect after all.

Please remember that we are always hear to listen and we can sometimes offer advice or support from external people. No parent is in this on their own.
