### A message from Mrs O'Hara

The Summer Term is always busy and if the first half of the term is anything to go by, we are in for an amazing second half. As well as being totally engrossed in our BOLD Curriculum, children had some wonderful experiences to support their learning and Personal Development. Now that the drier weather is here, we can enjoy the field more and be out and about doing Geography fieldwork. There is lots to reflect on in this newsletter as well as to look forward to , so please put the dates in your diary.

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### Young leaders

Our Eco-leaders have been very busy, carrying out lunchbox surveys and developing a wild life area.

Children shared their lunchbox contents with Eco-Leaders who were looking for evidence of a balanced diet that matched the Eatwell Guide. Whilst our surveys showed that the vast majority of pupils' lunchboxes matched the Eatwell Guide with fruit, salads and vegetables,

too many of the packed lunches included food that should be eaten in smaller quantities and not as often. In addition to this, pupils in KS2 are eating crisps and biscuit at breaks, when it should really be a piece of fruit. It is always pleasing to see the Nursery packed lunches as they are packed with fruits and vegetables, wraps, pasta and rice. Could I ask that families re-evaluate their packed lunches and ensure that pupils have a healthy snack at breaks.



#### Wild life area

With natural habitats under increasing pressure and many already lost or damaged, Eco-leaders decided to give nature a helping hand by creating a home where it can thrive. You may have seen the installation and gradual completion of a Bug Hotel outside the

school reception. Groups of children spent their lunchtimes selecting material and carefully placing it to provide a home for insect and bugs. In return they hope the insects will increase biodiversity, pollinate plants, and prey on pests. They also sowed some Coronation Wild flowers—lets hope they grow.





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### **Coronation Celebrations**

What a day we had! We built up to the day gradually, talking about the significance for our country and also within history, so that we already had some background knowledge for the day. In class, children looked even closer at different aspects of the Coronation, including the traditions and symbolism used throughout the service. Pupils also created art projects before their knowledge was truly tested in the afternoon by the Coronation Treasure Hunt. The weather was just right as children ran excitedly from one location to another in search of the next clue. Our day was a fantastic mix of learning and fun, and hopefully children will be able to look back in years to come and tell their children how they celebrated the Coronation of King Charles.







### **Scrap Shed**

You may have noticed that a sturdy looking shed appeared on the Lower School Playground—this is our new Scrap Shed! We are working in partnership with Scrap Shed, a social enterprise based in Leeds, focused on helping the environment by reusing waste materials from businesses as resources for art and play. Each shed is packed full of

recycled materials for children to explore and build with. As well as increasing children's problem solving, it keeps them active and promotes cooperation. As a celebration for completing their SATS, Year 6 were thrilled to have the opportunity to try the KS1 shed out for themselves. It has been so successful that there will be another one installed in KS2 later in the term. Fun, fun, fun!









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### Personal Development



Our Year 4 pupils had an amazing overnight stay in the Yorkshire Dales. As part of their study on rivers, they looked at the effect of water on the land, through a visit to Ingleborough Cave and Ingleton Waterfalls. The children were all very excited throughout the entire two days (eyes rolling) despite both days being physical. There was much awe and wonder on both days, topped off with a real life head scratcher—how do you make a bed?

There was much fun, laughter and encouragement for all. Year 3's get ready—this is something to look forward to next year (but please learn how to put a duvet cover on first.)





### Staying safe

There were also other learning activities to support children being 'danger aware' when near rivers and the road. Year 3 pupils went onto the streets of Poppleton for two mornings of training, identifying safe and less safe areas to cross the road. Both Year 3 and 4 learned how to stay safe near water and what to do if they get into difficulty in the water. I had a very interesting conversation with pupils afterwards to find out what they had learned—they gave me some very sensible advice about not going near the sea or rivers without an adult, not rescuing balls from the river and how to stay afloat to save energy.





In Year 6, pupils were visited by Magistrates to provide depth to their learning on Law, Crime and Punishment. The children were on their best behaviour and incredibly respectful of the work that our visitors did. There were some intellectual discussions and lots learned. Well done Year 6.
